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Shivaji Maharaj: The Monistic Vision of Unity and Resistance Focusing on History, Culture, and *Swarajya*

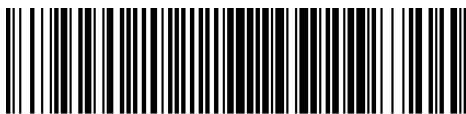
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Abstract :

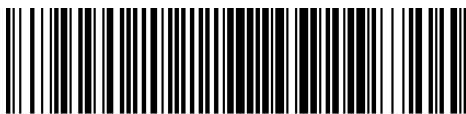
Trans-deconstruction: Theory on Monism (T2M) and Shivaji Maharaj

History, Culture, and Swarajya: Shivaji Maharaj's Monistic Vision



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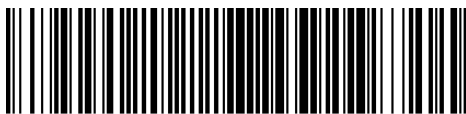

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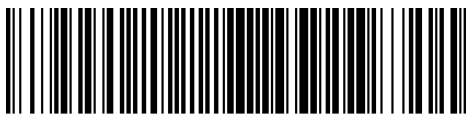
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
